Summary of Work Plan 2026-27

During 2026 to 2027 AISACT will continue to address the five National Priorities (NP) of Choice and Affordability of schools, Transition Assistance, Special Circumstances Funding, Strengthening Outcomes for Schools and Educationally Disadvantaged Schools and Students, and Student Wellbeing and Support.

During 2026-2027 the activities proposed under the Choice and Affordability Fund continue to build on the previous workplan (2022-2025), supporting ACT Independent schools in addressing the national priorities. The Work Plan has been developed in consultation with the AISACT Executive Committee and communicated to all Member schools. Projects and activities include both distributed funds provided directly to schools and to deliver centralised programs designed to best support schools in key priority areas such as:

- leadership support with a focus on middle leaders and fostering increased resilience
- Al literacy support and upskilling
- a range of courses for supporting students with disability
- staff and student wellbeing and resilience
- early career teacher support
- school governance support
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural understanding appreciation/awareness training
- support for students with disability
- support for student behaviour.

Under NP(a), Choice and Affordability of schools, grant funding will be offered to eligible schools in support of their work in facilitating parental choice of schools in the Independent sector in the ACT.

Transition Assistance (NP(b)) priority funds will be targeted to those schools that are negatively impacted by the shift to the Direct Measure of Income (DMI), as well as support for schools in general transitioning to the funding model.

Distributed funds will be available to schools through specific grant programs under the Strengthening Outcomes for Schools and Educationally Disadvantaged Schools and Students (NP(d)), and Student Wellbeing and Support (NP(e)) priorities.

Targeted Professional Learning opportunities will also be offered to support schools to address these priorities with a range of targeted programs over the two years available for leaders, teacher and board directors.

Special Circumstance Funding (NP(c)) will be available through direct grants for all schools who apply and meet the specific criteria to address unforeseen events and short-term emergency assistance.

Following extensive deliberation and consultation with the AISACT team, the AISACT Executive Committee and having an understanding of school needs and priorities, AISACT has determined the parameters by which the funding will be used and distributed to schools across the National Priorities.

Activity/Initiative	Facilitating Parental Choice
Priority	A – Choice and Affordability
Description	Alsact will continue the distribution of funds for 2026-2027 to every Member school that is eligible under this priority. This priority provides funding for initiatives that facilitate parental choice and opportunity, giving parents the ability to choose an affordable school for their child that aligns with their own values, education philosophy or faith and one that meets the needs of their child. The allocation each year to schools will be based on a school's enrolments and DMI. The allocation amount is based on a formula that was agreed by all Members. This funding will be used by each school for initiatives that facilitate measures which improve affordability for the parent community. Schools will receive correspondence outlining the predicted funding amount they could expect in the years 2026-2027. Schools will be required, on acceptance of the funds, to indicate how the allocated funds
	will contribute to the school's plans under this priority. Schools will be asked to provide a clear statement which articulates how this funding will contribute to affordability, and how they will promote the school as a choice for parents. Forward planning is assisted through the early identification of the
	proposed funding levels.
Eligible schools	All 18 eligible Member schools of AISACT are eligible to access CAF support (This excludes Communities @ Work Galilee School, a Special Assistance School and Marist College – receive CAF from Catholic Education).

Description	Financial and transition support will be provided to those schools which would meet the criteria determined by the AISACT Executive Committee. The AISACT Executive Committee determined that schools with an annual indexation rate below two per cent would be eligible to receive a direct grant under this Priority.

Priority	C – Special Circumstances Funding
Description	The Choice and Affordability Fund is available for schools to apply for assistance if they are impacted by a special circumstance, as outlined in the CAF Guidelines, for short term assistance. The nature of support to a school experiencing special circumstances will vary by the type of circumstance. As a contingency, \$50,000 in funding will be made available to provide assistance if required.
Eligible schools	All Member schools eligible to be supported through the Choice and Affordability Fund are able to apply to access this fund.
Timeframes	Schools are informed annually of the availability of this fund. Timeframes are determined by the circumstance, and when it occurs.

These direct grants will support programs/projects/initiatives/resources specific to a school which supports the focus of this Priority. Over the time of this workplan, it is anticipated that 50% of all Member schools would benefit from these direct grants (with the other 50% receiving grants 2028-2029).
