



Teacher Resource Hubs

The Australian Government will invest \$34.6 million over four years to continue delivery of evidence-based curriculum and student wellbeing support and professional development materials for all teachers and school leaders through a suite of teacher resource hubs.

How will this initiative work?

Over the past nine years, the Australian Government has funded the development of a wide range of resources across various platforms to support teacher professional practice and improve student outcomes.

This includes materials to support the teaching of literacy and numeracy, digital technologies, languages, civics and citizenship, as well as teacher workload reduction supports and student wellbeing information and materials.
